





SJYS Supports Kenya Dream

What is Kenya Dream? Besides being a pun on words (Kenya = Can yuh), this vision, this dream came as a fruition of the Cupertino High School class council of 2010 with Justin Li, who is both the Philharmonic principal cellist and president of the class council, to do something “different”, unlike any other class. Through connections at Cupertino Rotary Club, the class council pursued their dream. On May 3rd, 2007, the class council received the support of the class of 2010 with a signed petition to give 100% of the fund-raising (which is normally used for class parties, dances, and junior and senior prom) to support the Nthimbiri High School in Meru, Kenya which is located in the central part of Kenya in a town with a population of about 50,000. This dream will be to support the completion of the science building and upgrading toilet facilities and a new lunch room for the growing student population of over 230 students.

Justin solicited the support and collaboration of the SJYS Board of Directors and artistic staff. And they responded with enthusiasm. Yair says, “We thought it would be a wonderful opportunity for our members to utilize their music education to help people in need, particularly students their age who are in grave need for help. We’ve decided to team up with Cupertino high school in this two-fold goal - to support an educational institution internationally as well as to support SJYS. It is also a wonderful opportunity for an outreach to the Cupertino community while introducing to them all SJYS ensembles and orchestras. Finally, it is the first time in our history where we feature all our ensembles in the same concert which will allow our members to get to know and appreciate each other better.” There will a total of over one hundred and thirty volunteer members from the combined Philharmonic, Concert Orchestra, Concert Wind, Avant Flute Choir, and the Prelude and Intermezzo Ensembles for all three benefit concert performances. **SJYS will receive half of the proceeds from the ticket sales for these concerts.**



Ryo Fukuda and the Intermezzo String Ensemble

Intermezzo String Ensemble conductor Ryo Fukuda has been in the South Bay since 1998. He has established his own private teaching studio and is on the faculty of Santa Clara University Music department.

Having grown up on Manhattan in the Greenwich Village district of New York City, Ryo experienced the multicultural aspects of such a culturally diverse and rich city. Ryo's musical influence came at a young age, when Ryo would sit and watch his father painting on canvas and listening to classical music. However, Ryo didn't seriously take up music until his teens. Because sports and music requires discipline and practice, this passion in music occurred around the same time he wanted to play baseball for the powerful NY Yankees. He dreamed of being the first Asian to play for the Yankees. He had to make a choice and decided to forgo baseball and pursue musical studies at Manhattan School of Music. This was where classes with Professor Raphael Bronstein and lessons with Ariana Bronne influenced him and challenged him to further technical excellence in violin.

Ryo's favorite composers are Bach, Beethoven, Brahms and Bartok and he enjoys string quartet pieces. His favorite violin players are lesser-known: Jascha Heifetz, David Oistrakh and Nathan Milstein. To relax, he also listens to classic rock, jazz and pop. His favorite food is East Coast (New York) style pizza and he recommends several good ones in San Francisco: Amici's, Escape from New York and Irving Street Pizza.

Since 2002 at SJYS, he has seen each group of students progress musically and grow in maturity. His advice to each of the string ensemble players is to play with clean articulation of sound and blending the notes with delicacy and subtlety all the time instead of quickly going through the music. He deeply appreciates the support of the parents and looks forward to creating music with the Intermezzo String Ensemble on their next performance.

Music Teacher: Claudia Fountain

Hello SJYO students and parents. I am Claudia Fountain, a violinist, private teacher and music teacher in the Bay Area. I started violin in elementary school and was encouraged to take private lessons. During Junior High and High School, I was in the All Southern California Orchestra, 2 youth groups near my home, plus a quartet in my high school. I loved playing the violin and had an opportunity to go to a summer music camp at Idyllwild School on Music and the Arts in the tall pines after 8th grade. It was there that I made music and friendships that would influence my choice of music as a profession and a life. I met my college violin teacher there and later decided to attend USC as a music major. In addition to performing, I taught violin lessons and eventually decided to get a teaching credential so I could start other students in a love affair with music. I love working with elementary instrumental music students, my private students, coaching youth orchestras and playing violin in 3 orchestras about the Bay Area.



I think teaching music is amazing because the teacher learns as much or more than the student. As the teacher, you analyze the problems for a student and then find the steps for them to master the music. For the teacher, each lesson is a chance to observe how the student learns, to analyze the student's technical problems with the music, and to bring out the musical or expressive parts of the music to make it come alive to the student and the listeners. Teaching them to practice in a positive way, troubleshooting difficult passages and making a plan to master difficulties helps the student become a creative and accomplished learner with a positive attitude. To see the music through the eyes of each student and then assist them to bring out their best playing is always the goal. Impatience and criticism need to be left at the door, while encouragement and careful listening to what needs improvement will help students master technique, musicianship, poise and stage presence.

Ms. Fountain has a Bachelors of Music from USC and a Masters of Music in violin performance from the University of Miami. She teaches violin, viola and chamber music privately and instrumental music in the Berryessa School District. For the last 23 years, she has been a member of the San Jose Symphony, Symphony Silicon Valley, the Marin Symphony and the Monterey County Symphony. She can be reached at claudialf@aol.com
